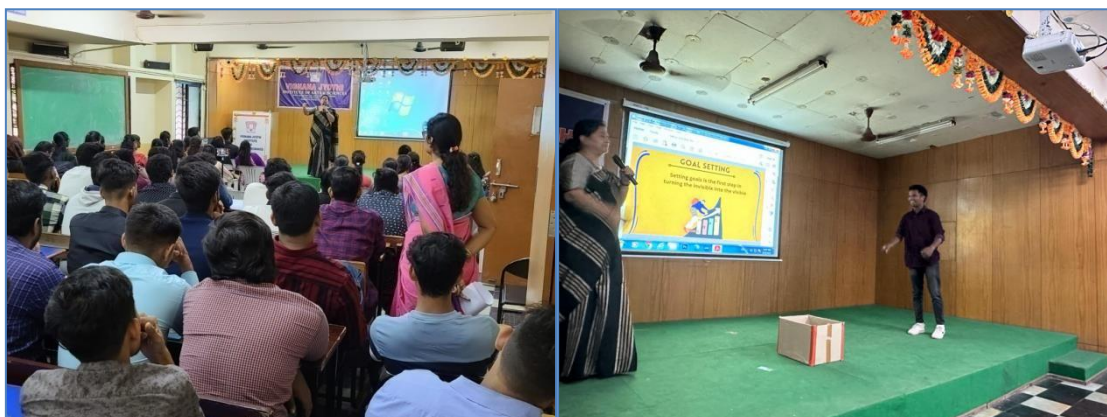

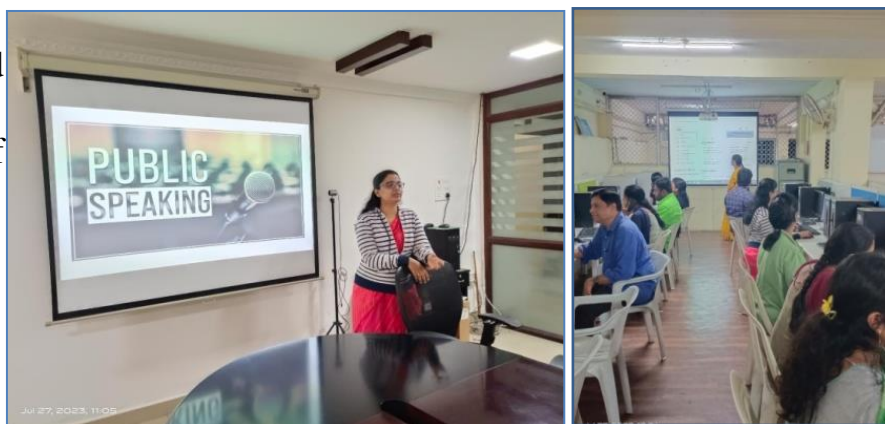

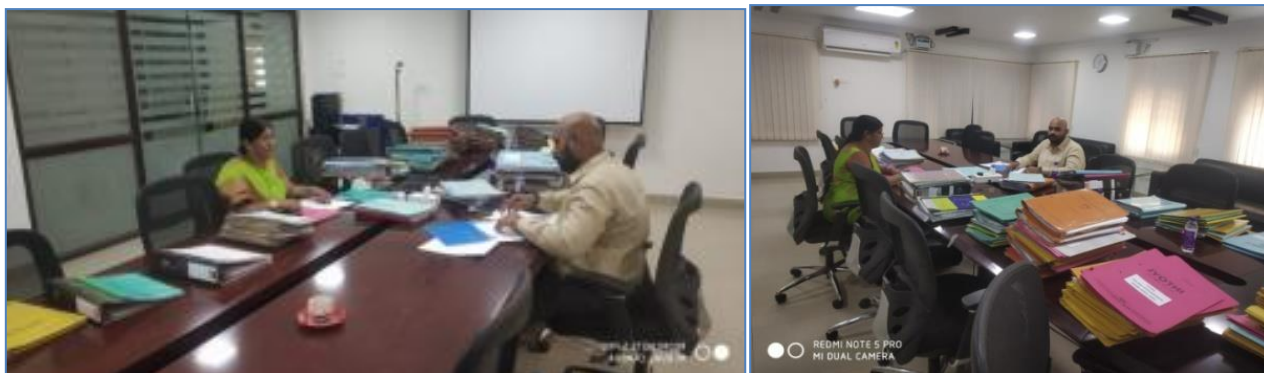

Use AI (Artificial Intelligence) to Transform Learning – ChatGPT

In today's world, technology plays a vital role in education. The COVID pandemic gave way to the rise of online teaching & learning and introduced many technical platforms for convenient learning. Among those technologies, Chat GPT is a recent phenomenon which is used worldwide for solving many problems in all domains. It was created by a San Francisco-based artificial intelligence Company (AI Company) which is known as Open AI. ChatGPT was founded by a group of entrepreneurs and researchers including Elon Musk and Sam Altman in 2015 and launched on 30th November 2022. Since then, it gained quick popularity with its detailed & immediate response to many questions related to many domains.

In ChatGPT, GPT's full form is 'Generative Pre-trained Transformer'. As the name suggests, the Generative model will generate text, pre-training relates to the enormous amount of data in it & the transformer refers to the architecture of the AI model in it. It uses the GPT-3 language model, a neural network machine learning model and the third generation of Generative Pre-trained Transformers. It is designed in such a way that it creates responses that humans would prefer to know about. It gives natural answers to queries raised in a conversational tone. It is basically similar to using Google Assistant or any other virtual assistants. It is used to generate text, summarise text, create stories or poems, create codes, debug codes, solve maths questions, completing assignment questions etc. Apart from these, it also provides creative ideas for a party, decoration, art etc.

ChatGPT is a valuable tool due to its depth of knowledge of various concepts. It provides personalized assistance to students by answering their questions and offering additional information. Therefore, teachers can integrate Chat GPT into online learning platforms for students as virtual tutors, providing guidance & feedback outside regular class hours. Even though AI shouldn't replace a teacher's lessons, it can be used as a practice tool to employ in the classroom & give pupils something fresh & on-demand support.

ChatGPT will be a helpful tool for teachers in many ways. It can be a great starting point for teachers to use when creating assessments from scratch. Teachers can input information into the AI program and provide context and ChatGPT will generate a result. It can grade & provide instant feedback on assignments, essay writing etc. It also provides quick, concise & direct answers that students can read in real-time. For students, ChatGPT is a valuable resource for completing their homework. It assists students in enhancing their writing abilities and provides corrections and suggestions for improvement.

Although ChatGPT is a powerful tool that can generate impressive responses on a variety of topics, it still has certain limitations such as lack of common sense, potential bias, difficulty with complex reasoning and inability to process visual information. ChatGPT poses different threats to the traditional education & research system, including the possibility of cheating on online exams, diminished critical thinking & problem-solving skills and difficulties in evaluating information generated by it. When using ChatGPT, it is important to keep in mind all the limitations of ChatGPT. It should not be relied upon blindly.

Recent studies show that there is a decline in the usage of ChatGPT, especially the latest version, ChatGPT 4, which is causing many issues while using it. In August, 2023, an analytics firm reported that ChatGPT experienced a third consecutive monthly decrease in website traffic. Global website traffic to the ChatGPT website, encompassing both desktop and mobile visits, saw a 3.2% decline, totalling 1.43 billion visits. This followed a roughly 10% reduction in traffic. Furthermore, the average duration of time visitors spent on the website has been decreasing steadily since March, dropping from an average of 8.7 minutes per visit to 7 minutes per visit by August.

However, the schools for the new academic year are expected to have a positive impact on ChatGPT's website traffic and usage. Some educational institutions have already started adopting ChatGPT as a tool and reflects on the slight rise in ChatGPT traffic. If we look into the future of ChatGPT and large language models (LLM), there are many exciting possibilities and open opportunities for this technology to enhance our lives and change the way we interact with technology. In the future, ChatGPT could be used to create more sophisticated virtual agents that can understand user intent and provide more accurate responses.

THE REALITY OF REJUVENATION OF ONE NATION – ONE ELECTION

The buzz word for long in political and administrative circles, being debated among intellectuals as well as commoners in India for the past few days is one nation one election. The idea of 'One Nation - One Polls' was suggested by Election Commission in 1983, according to which, a system should be evolved so that elections to Lok Sabha and State Legislative Assemblies could be held simultaneously. This concept is not new; India had held simultaneous polls for both the Centre and States from 1951 to 1967. However, due to the premature dissolution of some State Assemblies, separate elections for the Lok Sabha and Assembly became necessary. Furthermore, in 1971, Lok Sabha polls were advanced following the split in the Congress party. So gradually the concept of simultaneous polls got faded out.

Apart from Election commission, entities like the Law Commission of India, NITI Ayog, and a Parliamentary Standing Committee had already examined the issue. The Law Commission's report (January-2023), stated that simultaneous elections, in addition to saving public funds, would reduce the burden on security forces and promote greater involvement of the administrative machinery in the ongoing developed work rather than constant election preparations, and also further stated that, simultaneous elections is ideal and desirable but would require a workable formula in the Constitution. Prime Minister Modi has constantly advocated simultaneous elections since 2014. In September 2016, then-President Pranab Mukherjee, during an interaction with students at Rajendra Prasad Sarvodaya Vidyalaya within the Presidential estate, expressed the belief that holding simultaneous polls could be highly beneficial, suggesting that the Election Commission could work towards this goal.

Keeping the suggestions of different parties in view, on 1st September, 2023, the government set up a High-Level Committee (HLC) under former President Ram Nath Kovind (an eight-member committee) to examine the possibility of holding Lok Sabha and Assembly elections together.

The HLC will examine and make recommendations for the following:

- For holding simultaneous elections to the House of the People (Lok Sabha), State Legislative Assemblies, Municipalities, and Panchayats.
- Amendments to the Constitution and other laws (Representation of peoples Acts, 1950 & 1951 etc.) as may be required.
- Examines if the amendments to the Constitution would require ratification by the States.
- Analyze and recommend possible solutions in a scenario of simultaneous elections emerging out of a hung House, adoption of a no-confidence motion, or defection or any such other event.
- Suggests a framework for synchronizing elections, including the phases and time frame within which simultaneous elections may be held if they cannot be held in one go.
- Recommends necessary safeguards for ensuring the continuity of the cycle of simultaneous elections.
- Examines the logistics and manpower required, including EVMs, VVPATs, etc., for holding such simultaneous elections.
- Examines and recommends the modalities of use of a single electoral roll and electoral identity cards for identification of voters in elections to the House of the People (Lok Sabha), State Legislative Assemblies, Municipalities, and Panchayats.









Fears among stake holders:

- It would require at least five Constitutional Amendments—in Articles 83, 85, 172, 174 and 356. Of this, Article 174 deals with the dissolution of State Assemblies while the key Article 356 is concerned with the imposition of the President's Rule in States
- At least 50 per cent of the States should ratify the constitutional amendments. The states where opposition parties in rule may not ratify the bill.
- Synchronization of elections will require all existing Assemblies to be dissolved, which currently have different tenures, with some even only half-way.
- Some may argue that, it undermines diversity, favoring national parties over regional ones.
- Some fear that if State politics influence national elections, it may lead to unstable governments, contrary to federalism.
- Additionally, the possibility of unclear mandates could necessitate frequent fresh elections.
- While cost reduction is cited, expenses have raised even in non-partisan panchayat and local body polls. Many view combining these polls as unrealistic and a threat to democratic ideals in the long term.

Amidst of this much opposition and criticism if the government could pass the bill in the parliament, it would become one more unified system, which may not only save crores of rupees of public money, but also useful in effective unified policy making for the nation.
